

Bylaw No. 1166/2020, being the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw, provides for licensing, regulating, and confinement of dogs and cats in the Village of Delburne. All cats and dogs must be registered and licensed. Owners must provide their contact information along with a detailed description of their pet which includes their name, breed, sex and any other important information. Pet license fees are due every year by January 31st.

THE PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO LICENSE IS \$200 FOR THE FIRST OFFENCE.



Any officer or designated contractor with the municipality may seize and impound any animal running at large.

Responsible Pet Owner Checklist

- Pet is properly secured on the owner's property by a fence or dog run
- Pet is on a leash when off of the owner's property
- Pet is wearing a collar and valid pet tag

Barking Dogs

It is an offence to have a dog who barks constantly. The fine for the first offence is \$100 and then \$200 for the second offence.

Before taking action, Animal Control Services requires that a complainant track a barking dog for 5 days by providing the date and times that the barking started and ended.

Animal Control Services Cat Trapping Policy



When it comes to feral or at-large cats within the Village, the public must adhere to the Cat Trapping Policy which is enforced and monitored by Animal Control Services. Before a resident can trap, they must call Animal Control Services as well as sign a Cat Trapping Agreement. This policy is in place to ensure that cats are handled humanely.

Cat Trapping Policy

1. Traps are supervised once per hour. If set overnight, traps must be inspected first thing in the morning before 9 am. If there is a cat in the trap, Animal Control Services must be called.
2. Traps cannot be set when the temperature is higher than +24°C or lower than +3°C.
3. Traps must be set in the shade and in an area that provides shelter from the rain.
4. Traps cannot be set from Friday to Sunday or on statutory holidays as it is difficult to arrange the timely pick-up and transport of the cat.
5. When taking possession of the trap, the person must make arrangements ahead of time with the Animal Control Officer.
6. If a cat is trapped in the late evening, the person must move the cat in the trap to an indoor space until the morning when it can be transported to the shelter.
7. No one can tease or torment a cat in the trap.
8. If a trapped cat cannot be taken to a shelter within a 12-hour period, the person must release the cat, unharmed, to be trapped at a future date.
